Choosing accessible learning materials supports Universal Design for Learning (UDL) — a teaching approach that actively includes people with disabilities and makes learning accessible to everyone. When we choose accessible content, we improve usability—and successful outcomes--for all students, not just those with specific needs.

### Ways to stay C.A.L.M.

New WCAG 2.1\* Requirements - What You Need to Do

To make your teaching materials accessible, remember to:

- Describe Images clearly to convey meaning for all learners.
- ❖ Use Headings properly to organize content and improve navigation.
- ❖ Use Meaningful Links that describe the destination or purpose.
- Simplify Slides to keep information clear and focused.
- Check Contrast to ensure text is easy to read for all users.
- Caption On for all videos to support comprehension.
- Simplify/Summarize content so the main ideas stand out.
